Schools Grounds Improve "Special Achievement Certificate"

A garden club may submit a letter of recommendation to the State School Grounds Improvement Chairman, Pat Hathaway successaugusta1@aol.com, requesting a "special Achievement Certificate" for local schools who have engaged in worth school grounds projects. The LETTER should address the areas of achievement-outstand overall appearance, litter control, development of outdoor class rooms and /or landscaped design-and should include the school's name, principal and sponsoring club's name and address. Additional consideration may be given for development for specialty gardens, Arbor Day plantings and student participation. The annual deadline for garden clubs to submit this recommendation is March 1st. This certificate may be presented to the school by a Garden Club of Georgia member Garden Club.

DUES



Before and After— Revisiting the Sites of Articles Past

I think my adopted art form has five dimensions. There are the usual three—depth, width, and height. I like to add the dimension where you stand inside the creation and look at it from that viewpoint (I'm not sure, though, if that is a dimension or a perspective). The next dimension is that of time. If the plants don't croak they grow and change the total feel of the project as time goes by. My main professional compensation other than making a modest living is to visit the projects after a period of time and enjoy the changes. This past week I said, "Wow" several times.

Several times this past week, I found myself in the presence of sites that I have written articles about. Everything has changed—as gardening projects have a habit of doing. At any rate, here are some pictures of my visitations during the first week of December, 2013 and the links to the articles that tell about the inception of the projects.

I think one of the most significant projects was the Boys and Girls Club vegetable garden that we built in spring of 2009. [Diane Harbin and Rome, Georgia's Three Rivers Garden Club](#) were the moving factors behind the project. After four years the garden needed a bit of physical reworking and maintenance. We tackled the job. Some of the timbers had rotted out and there was a significant amount of weeds that needed removing as well as some irrigation concerns. These jobs are right down my alley.
